

Our School Crest


"Veritas Vincit" is a Latin phrase which means "Truth Conquers All."

At Key Stage 4, careers and personal development programmes are explored on a weekly basis with their form tutor. A careers meeting is also organised with a careers adviser to give our students the best and most up-to-date information available.

Key Stage 5 students will also have access to careers meetings, workshops and study skills programmes giving them the best possible opportunity to succeed and achieve their potential here in Lismore College!

Excellence in Pastoral Care

In Lismore College each student's safety and welfare is always of paramount importance. We pride ourselves on the quality of our child-centred pastoral care for all students by creating a caring, supportive and nurturing school environment that addresses each student's well-being. A key priority is ensuring we foster positive relationships based on our college's core values of Respect, Kindness, Hope, Commitment and Honesty.

Our excellent pastoral care team is proactive in understanding the individual needs and challenges of our students by fostering a culture of active listening and open communication which empowers our students to develop holistically.

Effective pastoral care underpins our school life and alongside our promoting positive behaviour policy we encourage and support each student to achieve their full potential. Lismore College is an all-inclusive school in which all students are valued for their unique contributions, abilities, and achievements. We promote diversity, acceptance and a sense of belonging for everyone in our College community.

Our Pastoral structure supports our caring child-centred ethos where every member of staff has a responsibility to ensure each student feels safe and gets the maximum benefit from their time in school. Each student will have a dedicated Form Teacher who will have a detailed knowledge of their individual needs, aspirations, interests and academic progress and will work with teachers, parents/carers and external organisations in supporting their learning and development. The Head of Year, supported by the Key Stage Leader, oversees the general welfare of all students in the year group. We also provide a Peer Mentoring Scheme which provides additional support for Year 8 students making the transition from primary to post-primary education.

Lismore emphasises the importance of a strong link between home and school in order to help ensure full attendance, completion of homework and revision for assessments. The pastoral team encourages parents/carers to communicate effectively with school to help support their child reaching their full potential.

SAFEGUARDING AND CHILD PROTECTION

Lismore College has a primary responsibility for the care, welfare and safety of all in our care. The aim of the safeguarding and child protection policy is to protect our students by ensuring that everyone has clear guidance on the detection and management of any situation where abuse or neglect of a child are suspected or disclosed. The central principle that our staff support is that every child has the fundamental right to be safe from harm and to have proper care given to their physical. emotional and spiritual well-being.

ANTI-BULLYING



The Learning Mentor Centre

The Learning Mentor plays a vital, supportive role in the school environment, focusing on helping students overcome barriers to learningwhether they are academic, behavioural, social, or emotional. Our Learning Mentor provides one-to-one mentoring and runs small group sessions. Their core function is to build a positive and trusting relationship with students who may be struggling with motivation, attendance, selfesteem, or transitioning into a new school phase. They work to identify the root causes of these difficulties, setting achievable, agreed-upon goals, and developing tailored strategies to improve the student's engagement, performance, and overall well-being. By acting as a consistent, nonjudgmental adult, the mentor helps students develop crucial life skills such as resilience, organisation, self-regulation, and effective study habits.

The Learning Mentor Room is specifically designed as a safe, neutral, and calming space, acting as a resource hub and a retreat from the general classroom environment. It is intentionally equipped to support the varied needs of the students who access it. The resources typically found here are practical and therapeutic. They include workstations for focused study or catch-up work, access to IT equipment for research or structured online learning programs. Beyond academic aids, the room is stocked with therapeutic resources such as fidget tools, stress balls, art and craft supplies for emotional expression, and social stories or feeling cards to help students articulate and manage complex emotions. This combination of physical and structured resources ensures the room can effectively serve as a place for both academic intervention and emotional de-escalation.



Learning Support Centre

The Learning Support Centre is at the heart of our new school and encapsulates the school ethos of Lismore College – "Lismore is a school for all." We are very proud that Lismore College is representative of the entire community.

We warmly welcome students with a wide range of physical, learning and health and wellbeing needs from feeder schools and schools from the wider community. Every student is an individual and we strive to meet their individual needs with a tailored transition plan that allows each child to settle in at their own pace, with the support of staff and parents. Preparation is key to a smooth transition for our new students. LSC staff collaborate with primary school teachers and SENCO's, support agencies and health and social care staff to make sure we create the best environment for our students.

The students in the Learning Support Centre benefit from the excellent facilities of our new college in mainstream and within the centre. In the centre, our spacious classrooms have access to a support room with ICT facilities, a quiet room and outside space. In addition, the learning support centre has a kitchen area and utility area to allow students to develop their life skills. A hygiene room with hoist and shower facilities; individual toilets and cloakrooms and a medical room are also provided for our students.

The curriculum is balanced to provide a range of learning experiences that includes social skills, life skills and health and wellbeing. Exercise and movement is part of our daily routine. All students in Key Stage 3 have access to weekly swimming lessons in South Lake Leisure Centre in addition to PE lessons in school. We use structured spelling and reading programmes as well as developing numeracy skills through interactive lessons and online Maths games.

Trips and days outs are organised throughout the year to celebrate the success of our students, for example this year we are visiting the W5 Halloween Workshops, the Christmas Pantomime in the Grand Opera House in Belfast and Emerald Park for the end of year trip.







Our Key Stage 3 students will progress to Key Stage 4 and will have access to a range of qualifications from entry level, OCN level and GCSE depending on their interests and abilities. This year we also have a group of students who have progressed to Post 16 and who are taught both within the centre and mainstream. They have the consistency of the supportive environment, trained staff and access to the broad and balanced curriculum available within mainstream subjects.

Year 8 student places, in the Key Stage 3 Learning Support Class and the Key Stage 3 Autism Specific Class, are identified by the Education Authority and parents are informed of places by the EA at the same time as mainstream students and families. Individual appointments can be made through the school office to visit the LSC.

Careers Education, Information, Advice and Guidance (CEIAG)

In this rapidly changing global economy it is more crucial than ever that students develop the skills needed to enable them to manage their own career development successfully, confidently and with due respect and care for their own needs, those of others and of their wider community.

Lismore College is committed to ensuring that students have access to exceptional Careers Education, Information, Advice and Guidance (CEIAG) within the school curriculum and through other agencies, to enable learners to develop essential career management and employability skills. CEIAG is fundamental in helping a young person to reach their full potential and realise their dreams. At Lismore College, we have a multi-tiered approach to this most important area. It is our aim to ensure each student, and their family is supported through the many decisions they make at each key stage.

Lismore has invested and is now partnered with an online careers platform called PeopleHawk. This AI enhanced platform empowers students to realise and achieve their full career potential.

At Key Stage 3 pupils embark on a programme of skills and knowledge development that continues through to Key Stage 5. The focus of learning at Key Stage 3 is on learning about the skills and qualities that will be required for life after Lismore. PeopleHawk supports this EPIC career learning journey by focusing on four key areas: Exploring, Preparing, Inspiring and Connecting. Prior to making their subject choices for GCSE, each student will attend a Post 14 options talk and whole school careers fair accompanied by their parents.

At Key Stage 4, students focus on their Post-16 Options, while learning how to make an effective transition from Key Stage 3. Supported by our online career's platform PeopleHawk, they research all options available to them and are interviewed individually by a specialist careers advisor from the Careers Service of Northern Ireland. They attend a post 16 options talk and careers fair accompanied by their parents.

In Sixth Form, students reflect on their achievements to date, as well as the personal skills and qualities sought by employers. Students, supported by PeopleHawk, examine local and global opportunities, Labour Market Information and different career pathways. They identify the decision making-strategies needed to make clear, realistic and informed choices in relation to Post – 18 pathways. Students will have access to a wide range of career enrichment opportunities such as SistersIN which provides mentoring, training and networking opportunities with a range of industry professionals.

Students research Post - 18 options and complete applications for UCAS, CAO, Further Education, apprenticeships or employment. They undertake interview preparation, work experience and other work-related activities which again is supported and facilitated by our online career's platform - PeopleHawk. Students will attend virtual or in person university Open Days and talks by visiting speakers/institutions.

Peer Mentoring

To support a positive start for our new Year 8 students, each form class is paired with two dedicated Post-16 peer mentors. These mentors meet with students every morning during registration, providing guidance, reassurance, and a friendly face as they settle into life at Lismore College.

Our peer mentors are carefully selected for their empathy, leadership, and commitment to helping younger students thrive. They play a vital role in ensuring a smooth transition from primary school to Lismore College by offering practical support and emotional encouragement.

Their aims are:

- Serve as positive role models, demonstrating respect, responsibility, and kindness.
- Help students build friendships and develop caring relationships within their class.
- Assist with navigating the school environment, including classrooms, facilities, and routines.
- Support the development of confidence and selfesteem through encouragement and praise.
- Actively listen to any concerns and provide reassurance or guidance.

- Promote participation in clubs, sports, and extracurricular activities to enrich school life.
- Offer tips for organising books, homework, and equipment to stay prepared.
- Share strategies for time management and study habits as students adjust to new expectations.
- Encourage a sense of belonging and inclusion, ensuring every student feels valued.
- Help students understand school rules and digital platforms used for learning and communication.

Transition

Lismore recognises that the transition from primary school to secondary school is a significant stage in the social, emotional and educational life of each of our students and their families. To ensure a smooth transition we have forged excellent relationships with the local feeder primary schools. We understand the importance of managing this transition effectively so that the students can enjoy and make amazing memories during their time in school. We place great importance on supporting every Year 8 student as they settle into life at Lismore College.

Key Stages in our Transition Programme:

- December P7 Taster days which give students the opportunity to visit our school, participate in a range of practical activities in different subject areas and also get to meet some of our students and staff.
- In January of P7 our senior staff will visit partner primary schools with past students to answer any questions the P7 students might have.
- In June of the P7 year, members of the Year 8 pastoral team will
 visit our partner primary schools to meet with the teachers of the
 students transferring to Lismore . We are provided with comprehensive
 information about each student's academic progress and any pastoral
 concerns.
- In June of the P7 year, we also invite Year 8 students who have gained a
 place in Lismore College and their parents into school for an induction
 afternoon. Parents/carers and students will receive key information and
 have the opportunity to meet with the Year 8 pastoral team and senior
 staff. This is also an opportunity to meet other students who will be
 starting their Lismore journey.
- In August of Year 8, students enjoy a phased entry into school without large numbers of students in other year groups. During this time in August they will complete a fun induction programme where the focus is on building positive relationships and getting to know their classmates. There will also be a face to face parent-tutor meeting for parents to inform the college about anything that can help make the transition smoother.

Health & Wellbeing

At Lismore College, we believe that emotional health and wellbeing are essential for every student's success and happiness. We are committed to creating a safe, supportive environment where students can thrive academically and personally.

Research shows that emotional wellbeing is closely linked to academic performance, attendance, and positive social relationships. Our approach aligns with the Department of Education Northern Ireland's Wellbeing Framework and supports the Children and Young People's Strategy.

Our whole-school wellbeing culture is built on a foundation of positive behaviour policies rooted in restorative practices and relational learning. We prioritize staff development through training in mental health awareness and trauma-informed approaches, ensuring that every member of our community is equipped to support student wellbeing. Additionally, we celebrate diversity and inclusion across the curriculum and through school-wide events, fostering an environment where every individual feels valued and respected.

Our student support systems are designed to ensure every learner feels safe, supported, and valued. We have a dedicated Safeguarding Team, Pastoral Care Team and a Health Promotion Co-ordinator who oversee the provision of care across the school. Students have access to qualified school counsellors as well as external mental health services when needed. To further strengthen peer connections, we offer mentoring programmes, particularly for transition years, helping students build confidence and a sense of belonging.

Curriculum integration plays a vital role in promoting wellbeing across the school. Personal Development and the Preventative Curriculum provide structured opportunities for students to explore key life skills and personal growth. Emotional literacy is embedded throughout all subjects, ensuring that learners develop self-awareness and empathy as part of their academic journey. In addition, we deliver workshops focused on resilience, mindfulness, and stress management, equipping students with practical strategies to navigate challenges and maintain positive mental health.

Our school places emotional health and wellbeing at the heart of everything we do. We have a dedicated team of Student Wellbeing Champions who promote positive mental health and peer support across the school. We are proud to be involved in the Education Authority's Being Well, Doing Well Programme, which helps us embed wellbeing strategies into daily school life. As a member of the Safer Schools App, we provide parents and students with expert guidance on online safety and mental health. In addition, we work in partnership with a range of external organisations-including the School Nursing Team, Action Mental Health, White Ribbon NI, Cara Friend, Lifeline, PSNI, Fitzone, Drumgor Detached, Money Twist, Made for More, Inspire, and Train2BSmart—to ensure our students have access to specialist support and resources when needed.

We uphold the highest standards of child protection and safeguarding, ensuring every student feels safe and supported.

Student Leadership

At Lismore College, we believe in empowering our pupils to become leaders and innovators within our school community. Admissions Criteria

In the case of pupils who have special circumstances the Board of Governors will determine the merits of individual cases and may offer a place without regard to the Admissions Criteria. Written evidence will be required to support any such request and must be given on or attached to the Transfer Application.

In the event of the number of pupils applying for places in Year 8 in September being greater than the Admissions number, the Board of Governors will apply the following criteria in the order set down below.

- 1. Pupils whose Transfer Application expresses Lismore as a first preference and whose normal place of residence is within the Parish of Moyraverty or Seagoe or the traditional catchment postcode of BT65.
- 2. Pupils whose Transfer Application expresses Lismore as a first preference and who are the oldest child or currently have older siblings in attendance at Lismore College.
- 3. Pupils whose Transfer Application expresses Lismore as a first preference and attended one the traditional primary schools below.

4. All other applicants.

In the event of oversubscription within any of the above categories the following sub-criteria will be applied.

- 1. Pupils whose Transfer Application expresses Lismore as a first preference and who are the oldest child or currently have older siblings in attendance at Lismore College
- 2. Pupils whose Transfer Application expresses Lismore as a first preference and who are the oldest child or have had siblings previously in attendance at Lismore College.
- 3. Pupils whose Transfer Application expresses Lismore as a first preference and do not qualify in 1 or 2 above.
- 4. Pupils whose Transfer application expresses a second preference for Lismore College.
- 5. Pupils whose Transfer application expresses a third preference for Lismore College
- 6. Pupils whose Transfer application expresses a fourth preference for Lismore College
- 7. Pupils whose Transfer application expresses a fifth preference for Lismore College.

In the event that, at any stage of the above sub-criteria being applied, there is more than one applicant for the final place, priority will be determined according to application of a randomised computer selection of letters.

*The use of the word sibling is defined as children who, at the date of their application, have a child of the family currently enrolled at the school. The phrase 'child of the family' covers children fostered, adopted etc. and avoids having to define all the various permutations of sibling.
